

# Uniform Domicile Act

(1962 Consolidation, page 95)

1. In this Act, "mentally incompetent person" means Interpretation  
.....
2. This Act replaces the rules of the common law for Common law re-  
placed  
determining the domicile of a person.
3. (1) Every person has a domicile. Domicile
- (2) No person has more than one domicile at the same Idem  
time.
- (3) The domicile of a person shall be determined under Idem  
the law of the Province.
- (4) The domicile of a person continues until he acquires Idem  
another domicile.
4. (1) Subject to section 5, a person acquires and has Place of domi-  
cile and pre-  
sumptions  
a domicile in the state and in the subdivision thereof in  
which he has his principal home and in which he intends to  
reside indefinitely.
- (2) Unless a contrary intention appears, Idem
  - (a) a person shall be presumed to intend to reside indefi-  
nitely in the state and subdivision where his princi-  
pal home is situate, and
  - (b) a person shall be presumed to have his principal  
home in the state and subdivision where the princi-  
pal home of his spouse and children (if any) is situa-  
te.
- (c) Subsection (2) does not apply to a person entitled to Where subs. (2)  
does not apply  
diplomatic immunity or in the military, naval or air force of  
any country or in the service of an international organiza-  
tion.
5. The person or authority in charge of a mentally Mentally in-  
competent per-  
sons  
incompetent person may change the domicile of the men-  
tally incompetent person with the approval of a court of  
competent jurisdiction in the state and subdivision thereof in  
which the mentally incompetent person is resident.
6. This Act comes into force on a day to be fixed by the Commencement  
Lieutenant Governor by his proclamation.
